



Klaus H. Wisiol

July 22, 1934 - December 18, 2021

Klaus H. Wisiol, 87, passed away on Saturday December 18, 2021, at a hospice in Libertyville after having a stroke. He was born 1934 in Germany and came to live in the U.S. in 1951. He was a former resident of Glenview and has lived at Prairie Crossing in Grayslake since 1995.

After a tour of duty in the U.S. Army, Klaus earned his college degree and MBA at the University of Wisconsin, Madison, after which he became an executive at Commonwealth Edison. He was also a board member and then head of Mount Sinai Hospital and later of the Sinai Health System. After retirement, at Prairie Crossing he served as board member and treasurer of the new community's first homeowner association for 12 years. He also became treasurer of the Prairie Crossing Stable. Hiking and skiing were continuing passions.

Surviving is his wife of 57 years, Karin Wisiol; his daughter Stephany (Wisio) Albert; grandsons Alexander and Tyler; and his brother Florian Wisiol, who lives in Germany. “ When we went hiking, Klaus was usually out in front. His steadfast pace was unwavering. While the rest of us loitered or hastened to catch up, he tirelessly set forth toward a majestic view, a waterfall or an icy pool of water where we could enjoy hypothermia after baking in the Utah sun. (The one time I led the way I took us off the trail and for a moment we were lost. It was serious because the temperature was over 100 degrees and we had consumed all the water we had brought with us. I took the initiative and scrambled, then slid on my butt, down to what I hoped was the trail. It was).

Klaus was unruffled as if it was okay if we made it and it was okay if we didn't. When the Twin Towers fell and he was trapped at the airport, he sat in a corner to meditate. Or nap. Who could tell?

He planned carefully, drove skillfully, moved gracefully like the lifelong athlete he was. He owned the space around him without saying a word. We once went to pick him up at the hospital after a medical episode and it was difficult to tell who was in charge. It seemed as though he had taken over and was giving directions to his caregivers.

We went to the Tacoma Art Museum when Karin and Klaus came to visit. Klaus stood in front of a still life and observed that the dangling strip of lemon peel was much too long to have been removed from the lemon to which it was attached. This was obvious as soon as he said it, but I would not have noticed it had he not pointed it out to me.

He had a transgressive, dry, playful sense of humor that made people smile. He also had one of the warmest, most genuine smiles I have ever seen. He would enthusiastically endorse whatever escapade the group set out upon and quietly enjoy the adventure. He was curious and would chat with people we met on the trails.

We had so many wonderful adventures together!
