John P. Estep, PhD, 70, passed away suddenly on Tuesday, October 19, 2021 at his residence in Grayslake, IL. “ So sorry that I don't have a newspaper coming anymore, & don't follow the obits. like I should, and didn't find out about Mr. Estep's passing until now.

I only had a handful of great, five star teachers throughout my time in the Libertyville school system, and John Estep was one of them. He taught history well. Much was expected of you in his classes. Term papers were to be typed and presented in a clear folder properly. He pointed out your mistakes and told you what you could do to improve.

His classes were very college-like, and I liked that. Estepardy, a take-off on Jeopardy, made learning fun.

One of the things he had in common with other teachers I admired was, he was a very student-friendly teacher, relating to students when I was there (1982-82), because he was still pretty young himself and knew what you were going through in life. If, however, anyone acted up, he could be a disciplinarian, (a good thing). There were no "class clowns" in his classes.

I had signed up for his Psychology class for senior year, but had absences due to illness, and got behind and had to drop out of the class, because I knew I wouldn't be able to keep up. We had a talk about it, and he really wanted me to stay.

When I saw him in the hallways at LHS, he always said hi to me by name.

My mother used to remember him as a tall, lanky kid walking to high school in front of our house on Garfield from McKinley.

We need more teachers and more people like John Estep in this world.

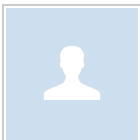
