Lee M. Engman, 86, passed away on Tuesday, September 2, 2025 in Libertyville, IL. He was born January 3, 1939 in Virginia, MN and had lived in many destinations around the world, living in Mundelein, IL for the past 50 years. Lee was a graduate of Gustavus Adolphus College in St. Peter, MN and Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, CA where he received his master's degree. He was a United States Navy veteran, retiring after 20 years as Lieutenant Commander. Lee was a member of American Legion Auxiliary Post #867, was an employee of Baxter International for 22 years and a member of St. Andrew Lutheran Church in Mundelein. In his youth, he coached minor league hockey in Maine and became an NHL scout. He always told the best stories. He enjoyed fishing & hunting, keeping up on current news, traveling the world, visiting places with old and new friends and was a devoted Minnesota Vikings fan.

Surviving are his 3 children, Kimberly (Eric) Lundquist, Lee Erik Engman & Charlie Engman; 4 grandchildren, Sofia, Anna, Natalie & Danielle; brother, Dr. Martin (Devorah) Engman and by sisters-in-law, Jeanne (Anthony LePore) Cusick & Sharon Fanelli.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Joanne Engman in 2014; an infant sister, Juliann; sister-in-law, Mary (Clem) Arricale and by brother-in-law, Joe Fanelli, Jr.

“ Although Lee was in his 80's, the call from Martin was unexpected and very trying for me. Being the cousin of Lee's on the 'younger side' (I guess I'm the third youngest) honestly growing up there was not much between us. I very well remember Lee spending time as family at Lake 14 in the summers and of course Christmas eve spent at "P.S.'s house but for me it was called 'Ann's house as P.S., sadly had passed by the time I came along. Those memories are cherished by me. Never have I seen, let alone heard of a family gathering as we shared. The challenge was who was Santa Clause, the parents always outsmarted us just as we thought we knew, it was not that person. Even Auntie Kay was Santa to throw us all off even more. The real Lapland boots, the reindeer bells, songs at the piano all night, the food, the glug, and of course dancing in a circle with Santa singling Julen Bocker Coma Err (or however it's spelled) and then oompa oompa oompapa.

I started this saying Lee and I were years apart, with only Christmas and Lake 14 connecting us but then somehow, his doing not mine, later in life, quite honestly, weekly, Lee would call the office. Many times he'd start of "oh how I love hearing those words....Good afternoon Engman Agency". The office is still open he'd say. He loved Virginia, we'd talk about stores past and present. We'd talk about cousins, Horace Mann School, his kids and grandkids and mine. Lee played hockey and my grandchildren do now also and he took a genuine interest in their advancement and their playing. Lee was a well educated man who served his country but he certainly was the most humble and thoughtful person I knew. With all he experienced in life, family, past, present, and the future of his family was the center. He never missed an opportunity to say something very respectful and kind about my father and I truly appreciated that. He found ways to always talk about something about our uncles and aunts, he was also one of the first to contact me when one passed and his thoughts were always the same...family.

He faced adversity with strength and faith. I've learned from him. I don't know why we became so close later in life, but I'm blessed we

have. I already miss his weekly calls hearing someone on the line tell me how good it is to hear those words....Good afternoon.....

The last time my sister, Suzy, and I were together we decided to give Lee a call. She wanted to remind him of an adventure they had when she was young. Lee had suggested he take her for ice cream. Of course, she was thrilled and felt grown up to be asked for an ice cream outing with this older cousin. They both enjoyed recalling this memory.

Christmas Eves in Virginia, MN at the PS home were magical. The welcomed glass of glogg (mulled wine aka “sacred family recipe”) as you came in the door from the cold, the songs around the piano with all our young voices, the Julen Bocker dance with Santa, evening church, and our last stop before the drive back to Duluth at Lee and Martin’s home for homemade goodies and coffee. Of my childhood memories these were the very best of times. Can you imagine my joy as a grown woman when Lee and brother Martin (on a trip through Minneapolis) brought us cousins each a prized jug of

the "family recipe"? Especially for me it was an unbelievable treat – and a tasty one indeed!

Lee was so loved!
