Michael John "Mickey" McCarthy, 73, passed away on Sunday, Oct. 21, 2012, at Highland Park Hospital. He was born Nov. 26, 1938, in Chicago, and had been a resident of Gurnee since 1975. He was a US Marine Corps veteran and was member of the Vietnam Veterans. Michael was a retired animal control officer for the city of Skokie. Surviving are his son, Michael James McCarthy (Beth Krumrey) of Round Lake Park; his brother, Frank Butera of Michigan; and dear friend, Annie Wells of Villa Park. He was preceded in death by his wife, Darleen McCarthy on Sept. 2, 2009. “ Earlier in the week, Mickey's son Mike had asked me to say something at the funeral, but there was some confusion at the funeral home and people were not invited to speak. Here's what it would've been: A big part of Mickey's life was spent in Skokie, that was where he started working in 1968, and that's why a lot of us know him. He was the first animal control office in the Village of Skokie and he was the go-to guy that the village went to when they had problems with citizens. Anybody who knew Mickey knew that he could schmooze with the best of them. Talking was probably one of his favorite pastimes, but he was always there to lend him a helping hand. Over the years, I've learned that Mickey was a lot of things to a lot of different people. To his friends that he went to gun shows with, he was the Troll man. I think that I might accidentally hung up on his friend, Bill, once when he called the house looking for the troll and I thought that it was some sort of crank call. Mickey would go out of his way to help just about anybody and, as many of you know, he could even be offended if you didn't ask for help. He loved to tell stories and was good adding special embellishments for everyone. Mickey was also talented to a fault, at pushing people's buttons, especially his partner from Skokie, Marianne's. Fortunately, they both shared a love of animals and a strong bond that has enabled them to persevere as friends. Mickey made some of his closest friends while he worked in Skokie, including some of the people who were at his bedside during his final days. Over the past 20 years, he has been active with a couple of veterans groups: the Vietnam Vets and the American Legion. He held offices at both and devoted a lot of time to their philanthropic endeavors. Together, they raised a lot of money for long-term residents of the VA in North Chicago, as well as other veterans who needed a helping hand. For the people who have known him over the

He's the guy who made sure to tell those close to him that he loved them and wouldn't let them leave or get off the phone with him until they told him the same. Mickey was supposed to be the indestructible Marine who would outlive everybody. Now, we must take solace in him being at peace and maybe Heather nipping at his heels if he disturbs Darleen's garden, in heaven. Mickey was a great man and he will be missed by all whose lives he touched.
